Over the past several years I have been introduced to some excellent teachers of faith. These are folks who have been the practitioners of contemplation. These teachers have taken the time to share their wisdom and experience of quieting the troubled and busy mind and seeking to live with “the mind of Christ.” (1 Cor. 2:16)

When I first heard about contemplative prayer, I thought that it meant that I would have to give up my life in the world. Surely contemplatives are people like monks and nuns who live a completely monastic life away from the world. Their days would be filled with daily chores, prescribed prayers, and chanted psalms and hours. But as one of my teachers told me early on, being a monastic is not one in the same with being contemplative. Our distractions follow us everywhere that we go. Teresa of Avila complained in the 16th century that no one told them exactly “how” to deal with the distractions that followed them into the monastery.

Over the years we have lost this contemplative tradition and it was no longer being taught in any sort of systematic way in the church. We have recited prayers and some would say that we have meticulously performed liturgies,

but the older and more ancient forms of quieting the mind and heart had largely been lost in theory and in practice. And who among us has not found ourselves in need of some peace of mind?

During this season of Lent I want to invite you to come and explore some of these ancient faith practices. In the Wednesday night community dinners and education time we will have guest presenters and opportunities to practice these ancient faith practices. For some of you this will be a completely new experience. Some of the practices will resonate with you, others may not. At the heart of contemplation is the mind of Christ that embraces the world with boundless compassion and love.

This season let Lent offer us all a special opportunity to grow in our relationship with God and to deepen our commitment to a way of life that is rooted in our baptism and our connection to Christ himself. In our busy world take some time to come and be. Set some time apart and learn how to calm our busy and distracted minds that we may be more present with each other, more compassionate with each other. And may the peace of Christ be with you this Lenten season.

Noah's Ark Project 2015

Noah's Ark 2015 Sunday School

Project began on February 22 and continues through to the end of March. The animals featured this year are sheep and goats. Gifts of animals are essential in enabling families who live in rural areas, where living conditions are often very difficult, to lift themselves out of poverty. But, not every animal is suited for raising in all environments. That is why the Sunday school is collecting offerings to give the gift of both sheep and goats.

Sheep are animals beneficial to poor farmers who live in latitudes and at altitudes where the environment can be very cold. Warm durable wool from sheep can easily be woven into hats, sweaters, coats and blankets to keep family members warm and dry. These items and/or the wool itself can also be sold at the local market for extra income. In addition, nutritious dairy products can be made from sheep's milk.

Goats are known to survive in dry, drought-prone climates where it's hard to raise other animals. Fresh goat's milk provides needed nutrition for children who are growing. And, since goats multiply rapidly, families often share the offspring with their neighbors, helping lift entire communities out of hunger and poverty.

Two sheep and four goats can be purchased for \$500; four sheep and eight goats for \$1000; and, if we reach last year's offering of \$1,500, we can provide gifts of six sheep and fifteen goats! These animals will be purchased through the **ELCA Good Gifts Catalog**.

Whatever you can give toward this project will send the message of God's love through Jesus Christ for "these least important ones." (Matt. 25: 40 & 45)



Lenten World Hunger Appeal

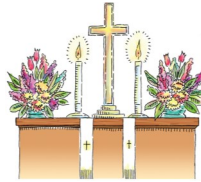

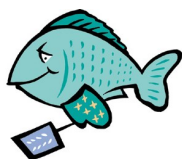
Holy Trinity donated 75 pounds of mixed non-perishable food items to the Food Bank in January.

Dear Friends,

Greetings from east Africa (where it is 79 degrees and sunny this morning!). Last week marked the one year anniversary of my arrival in Rwanda, and I am giving thanks in these days for all the prayers and support which makes my ministry here possible. A special word of thanks for all the notes, cards, and letters I have received from Trinity in recent months.

A year ago I was just beginning to learn about the Lutheran Church of Rwanda and trying to imagine how young adults from America might serve in this place. As I begin my second year, the Young Adults in Global Mission (YAGM) program is up and running, and I am working with 6 incredible young people from the US who are "walking with," serving, and learning from Lutherans in Rwanda. My work is to be guide, teacher, cultural translator, finance manager, pastor and host to these young people, as well as being a resource for the Lutheran Church of Rwanda.

There is a saying in mission circles that "the longer I live in another culture, the less I know." I find this to be true: just when I think I have things figured out about life in Africa, I realize that I've only understood a fraction of what is happening and that there is so much more to learn. Being a missionary is often humbling in the midst of grace and many blessings!

As my second year unfolds in these days, I remain grateful for your partnership in my mission and ministry, and grateful for connections that stretch from Pennsylvania to Rwanda. Thank you! I look forward to staying in touch.
